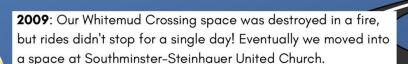

A Brief History of Drive Happiness

Join us for a trip down memory lane!

1998: Lifestyle Helping Hands Seniors Association was created in Southwest Edmonton, becoming incorporated shortly after in 2002.



2012: Our service began expanding outside Edmonton, eventually becoming established in over 50 locations (and counting) across the province!

2016: Drive Happiness joined PEGASIS, a collaborative of senior-serving agencies in Edmonton working to reduce social isolation.

2018: Our name officially changed to Drive Happiness Seniors Association, and we celebrated our 20th anniversary in style.

2019: We moved into our 99th street office and co-hosted a screening of the film 'Breaking Loneliness,' which features some of our riders and volunteers! If you haven't had a chance to watch this documentary, we'd highly recommend it.

2020: We safely continued operations throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, adding delivery services and collaborating with organizations like the Edmonton Food Bank. Drive Happiness was nominated for a Minister's Seniors Service Award, and won a Janet Hughes Award for lessening food insecurity, a Bettie Hughes Memorial Award from the Canadian Association of Mental Health, and a Social Services Award.

Today: Drive Happiness is the largest non-profit providing assisted transportation in Alberta, with almost 200 volunteers and 1600 active riders. Since 2012, we've completed 70, 000 rides and thousands of deliveries. We expand our service area and the number of people we serve annually- thank you to everyone who has helped make it happen! Here's to many more years.

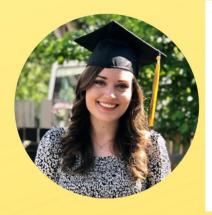
